



## PROCESSING TOMATOES

### Stress protection - Inside & Out



#### ***Season Long Protection***

Reduced transplant shock  
Reduced flower abortion  
Increased fruit set  
Reduced fruit drop  
Increased fruit quality  
Increased fruit size  
Improved Brix/TSS



#### ***Block out sunburn Lock in yield***

Increased marketable yield  
Higher pack outs  
Reduced grading costs  
Increased profit

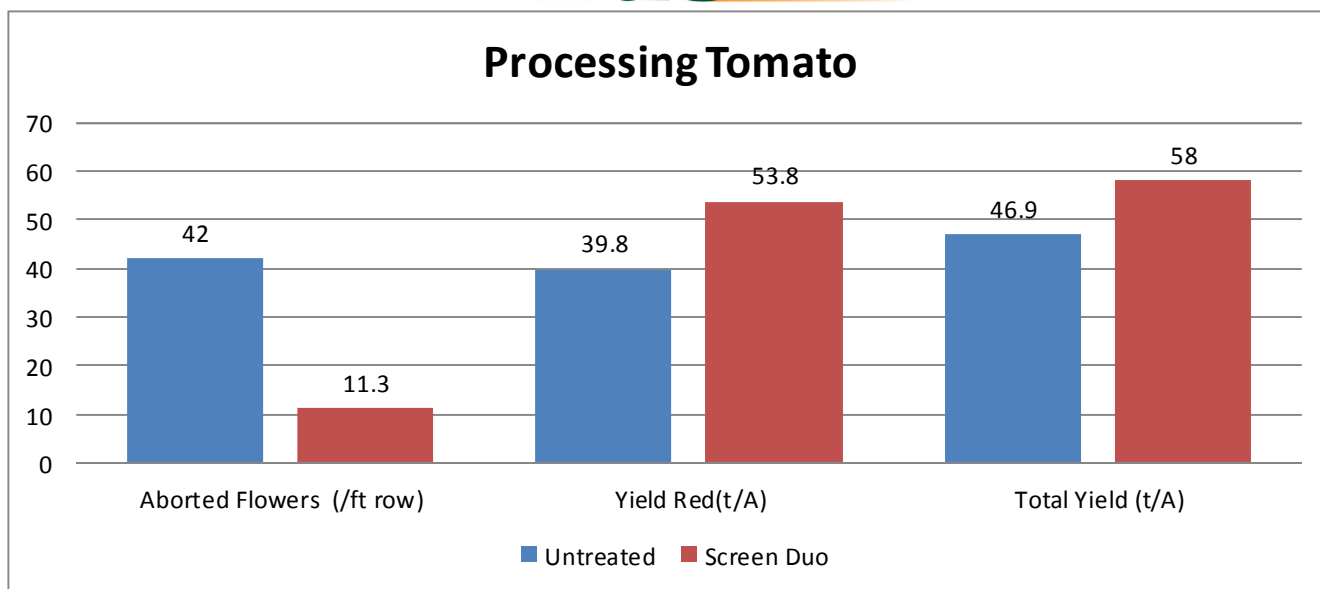


#### ***Cooler crops use less water***

Use less water for cooling  
More water used for photosynthesis  
Up to 30 - 40% reduction in potential water use  
Improved sustainability of deficit irrigation

### Season long stress management works best

- Reduced flower abortion = *increased fruit set and yield*
- Season-long reduction in heat and light stress = *reduced sunburn and increased fruit quality*

## Use Directions

### 1. Processed or Washed Post-harvest

#### Season Long Program (Preferred)

Apply a minimum of 6 lbs/acre (broadcast basis) in sufficient water to provide a uniform film over foliage. Begin applications immediately after transplanting and continue at 7-14 day intervals, or as needed. As vegetative growth slows, spray intervals can be extended to 14–21 days between treatments.

#### Sunburn Management Only

Make initial application of 20 lbs/acre in sufficient water to provide a uniform film over foliage and fruit. Make additional applications of 10 lbs/acre every 7-14 days, or as needed. Begin applications when fruit are approximately 2-3 cm in diameter.

### 2. Fresh Market – No post-harvest Wash

Apply a minimum of 6 lbs/acre (broadcast basis) and continue every 7-14 days, or as needed, until 4 weeks prior to harvest.

*Spray Screen Duo in a band on young plants to reduce costs  
Do Not Treat Transplants By Dipping*
